REPENTANCE

For the sorrow that is according to the will of God produces a repentance without regret, leading to salvation. ~ 2 Corinthians 7:10 NASB

In the seventh century, John Climacus wrote, "Repentance is not to look downwards at my own shortcomings, but upwards at God's love. It is not to look backwards with self-reproach but forward with trustfulness. It is to see not what I have failed to be, but what by the grace of Christ I might yet become."

Repentance doesn't need to be painful. You don't have to beat yourself up for mistakes you've made. Instead, repentance is a blessing – the birth of a new life. It leads to transformation and to salvation. The Greek word that is translated as "salvation" also means "well-being, safety, prosperity, deliverance from destruction." When you repent, you simply get back on track, back on God's path of blessing.

Show me, God, where I have gotten off track. Give me the courage to repent, so that I can be exactly who You want me to be.

Pastors Corner of Light: Trusting the Light!

Last week I spoke of finding the light – rekindling the desire to know God and know God's Word. When we find that relationship with the Lord, we must have the conviction of following and trusting Him. We have all been through tough moments when we wonder where God is. If you read through the many biblical narratives written in the Word, we see God working behind the narratives bringing the characters into situations they would have never planned themselves. It's important to recognize that the workings of God's grace aren't always predictable or comfortable or the way we expect.

Consider the story of Moses – raised as a son of Pharaoh but finding himself as a shepherd out in the wilderness of Midian. His life is, unknowingly, preparing him to fulfill God's promise to Abraham that his descendants would spend 400 years in slavery and then be delivered into the Promise Land.

The book of Ruth illustrates human hardship and human love but also God's assurance that He will exercise His wisdom and His sovereignty; He will remember His promises and will deliver gifts of kindness and grace. At the end of the story, Ruth and Boaz have a son. He was named Obed and is to become the father of Jesse, the father of David.

These words give us a sense of what this story has been about all along. Through this little story of hardship and love, God sets things in place to deliver something that is anything but little – the ultimate promise, the gift of gifts, the Savior, Jesus Christ, through whom God's redeeming love will flow. We need to see and believe that God will work and continue to work His redeeming plan until that plan is complete; this is the ultimate story behind every other story. Remember that it is at the intersection of God's sovereignty and His grace that life and hope are found. Our perseverance and faith will be rewarded: **James 1:12** "Blessed is a man who perseveres under trial; for once he has been approved, he will receive the crown of life



And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise. ~ Philippians 4:8 NLT
